

Phlebitis – following insertion of a device such as cannula or PICC

What is phlebitis?

Phlebitis is the inflammation of the wall of a vein.

The signs and symptoms are redness along the vein, pain and/ or swelling. Sometimes the vein can become discoloured and feel hard and tender.

What causes phlebitis?

Phlebitis is caused by chemicals, such as antibiotics or chemotherapy drugs such as EC or by mechanical irritation of the vein by the device such as a cannula.

Can you prevent it?

We try very hard to prevent it by diluting the drugs you receive so they are not too concentrated and therefore do not irritate your vein.

We always put the smallest size device into your vein to reduce the mechanical irritation.

A heat pack can be used during the infusion which may relieve discomfort at the time of treatment.

What can be done to relieve my symptoms?

Warmth, like a covered hot water bottle and resting the arm on a pillow, may relieve any pain and inflammation.

Some patients have found ibuprofen gel (ibugel) helpful. This can be brought over the counter at your local chemist.
